Try one creative activity unrelated to studies this week - sketching, writing, video editing or design. It refreshes your mind and often clarifies what you actually enjoy.

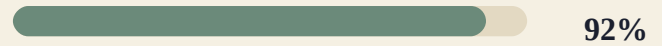

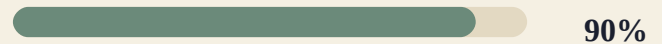

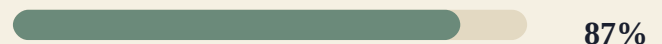

● Spoken Discussion (Strongest)

Rewrite your class notes in your own words every evening. This single habit improves both understanding and recall significantly.

● Hands-On Practice

Learn by doing - solve past papers, build models, or connect each concept to a real example. Practice cements ideas faster than re-reading.

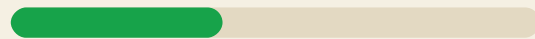

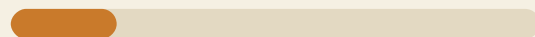
